Glossary of Key Terms

- **All Power:** The complete and absolute authority of Jesus Christ over all realms, which is also available to believers through faith in Him.
- **Exousia:** Delegated authority and power, given to Jesus and extended to believers.
- **Doxa:** Glory and splendor, often associated with divine presence and power.
- **Dunamis:** Power for performing miracles and supernatural acts, accessed through the Holy Spirit and the spoken word.
- **Ekklesia:** The assembly or gathering of believers, translated as "Church," representing a governmental entity with authority in the world.
- **Gate of Hell:** Metaphor for forces of darkness and opposition to God and His people, which believers are empowered to overcome.

- **Rocks to Bread Transformation:** Metaphor for the transformative power of faith and the Holy Spirit, enabling believers to change situations and bring forth God's provision.
- **Joint-heirs with Christ:** The concept that believers share in the inheritance and authority of Jesus Christ as sons and daughters of God.
- **Temptations in the Wilderness:** Three trials Jesus faced, demonstrating the vastness of His power and the nature of the enemy's tactics.
- **The Great Commission:** The command given by Jesus to His disciples to spread the Gospel and make disciples of all nations, empowered by the Holy Spirit.
